– ENHANCING THE AREA –

The council have planted further trees and daffodil bulbs again this year as we look to make the parish a more attractive and brighter place. It was very disappointing that all three trees planted on Springfield Way fell victim to vandals. We aim to replace these trees with more mature specimens. As with any antisocial behaviour, if you see it report it – call 101 for non emergency incidents, if it is reported, the Police can focus on areas where there are issues.

CHRISTMAS LIGHTS

Additional Christmas lights were purchased and installed on the trees to brighten the parish over the festive period.

ROYAL CELEBRATION

King's Coronation commemorative water bottles were provided for the children at the three local primary schools and commemorative seats installed on Springfield Way and Anlafgate.

REMEMBRANCE DAY

This year the Parish Council purchased and put up Remembrance Day flags on railings in Anlaby and Anlaby Common and Tommy lamp post signs, made by Veterans, as well as a wreath at St. Peter's Remembrance Sunday service, to recognise the sacrifices made by our Armed Forces and Veterans.

ANLABY LITTER PICKERS

Litter picker volunteer numbers continue to rise, helping to reduce the unsightly litter in the parish by committing to at least two hours a month (unpaid). The Parish Council will provide a tabard, litter picking tool, waste bags and gloves to volunteers. We are very grateful to all the ALPs volunteers for the time and service they provide.



DEFIBRILLATORS

Grants have been awarded for two defibrillators in the parish, other applications are welcomed and the Parish Clerk can provide the criteria for anyone interested.

STREET FURNITURE

Additional litter bins and village signs have been installed and bird boxes for Anlaby House grounds made by Men in Sheds Haltemprice.

My Community alert is a free message system operated by Humberside Police, Fire & Rescue, the office of the Police & Crime Commissioner. It gives information about incidents in your area and you choose how you receive messages and how often you want to have these messages. - The Parish Council is looking to recruit additional councillors, attendance at the monthly meetings is a requirement and beyond that the involvement can be as much as the individual councillor is able or wants to commit to. Eligibility is to have been resident in the parish or within 3 miles for at least one year or worked in the parish for over one year or owned property in the parish for over one year.
- Community Speed Watch – speeding on parish roads is an ongoing issue and we have liased with the office of the Police and Crime Commissioner and identified five initial sites that are suitable. We now need volunteers from the parish to be part of the Community Speed Watch, and commit to a minimum of two hours a month. Training will be provided free of charge by Humberside Police Community Speed Watch Coordinator. Please contact the Parish Clerk to register your interest.

– ANLABY ANNALS –

Origin of Anlaby–A Danish jarl or military commander named Anlaf decided he wanted to settle with his men in this area. In 867 AD Anlaf agreed with the ealdorman (high ranking official) at Beverley that he would create a permanent settlement on unoccupied land between Hessle & Cottingham, and that his men be allowed to chose wives from these two villages and Weighton and Riplingham.

In return the Danes were to clear and till the land they had chosen and behave themselves towards the surrounding villages.

Other local villages settled by the Danes at this period were Willerby, Skidby, Wauldby, Tranby and Ferriby, the ending of 'by' or 'byr' means farm. Such was the beginning of Anlafsbyr or Anlaby to use the later name.
