### What's happening in Your Area & Community Priorities



New: New cycle for Christmas? Follow our security tips to keep it safe.

Humbertalking has set our priorities, this month we are to:

- 1. Reduce ASB improve the quality of life.
- 2. Prevention of Residential dwelling Burglaries & vehicle crime.



*Here's a summary of just some of the crimes that have been reported across all Wards last month:* 

**Residential Burglary reports: (four reports made last month)** 

3/12/24 Nandike Close, Hanoi Burglary to property after suspect has entered address via an unlocked front door and victim's house and vehicle keys have been in the inside of the door. Suspect has taken car keys and vehicle leaving behind a black Carrerra bicycle. Following extensive enquiries one adult male is charged and arrested with police bail while enquiries continue.

12/12/24 Ellerker Rise, attempt entry to property after suspect approaches door and tries the handle with negative results.

16/12/24 Kingston Road, attempt entry to outbuilding (shed) with negative results.

16/12/24 Kingston Road, shed burglary after occupants discover that the door had been forced open and searched. There has also been damage to fencing panels where the suspect has climbed over the garden to gain entry. Nothing stolen at this time. Enquiries ongoing.

Business burglary reports: (one report made)

6/12/24 Store More Self Storage, business burglary to premises after three male suspects attend the storage company and use a pin code to gain access to the car park. Once inside suspect has used and angle grinder to cut through a storage room door and have then bent the metal door upwards, oncer inside steal an unknown amount of vape products. Enquiries ongoing.



Thefts: (three reports made last month)

1/12/24 Marks & Spencer, suspect male matches the description of a male suspected of shop theft and is subsequently stopped under a Pace 1 search where officers found £90 worth of shop goods, including meat and chocolate. Enquiries still ongoing.

11/12/24 Wolfreton Lane, theft from vehicle, power tools and cash stolen from within, enquiries still ongoing.

31/12/24 Wolfreton Road, theft from vehicle, garden tools stolen from within, enquiries ongoing.

1. Reduce ASB and improve quality of life within the community. Throughout the following weeks you will see a clear presence of patrols in and around your neighbourhood. December was and remains one of our busiest periods by far and the increase in patrols at the time acted as a deterrent for would be criminals who may have been intent on causing harm or committing offences.

Action - Our Neighbourhood Policing Teams work with our key partners and the community to reduce anti-social behaviour and the anti-social use of motor vehicles. We provide proactive responses to reports of anti-social behaviour in our neighbourhood Area and are constantly reviewing our patrol strategy to address this. We are working hard with partners to address this and ensure our market towns and rural communities are a safe place to live and work.





### 2. Preventing Residential dwelling Burglaries & vehicle crime.

During the winter months, it is usual for us to see crimes such as burglary and theft rise, particularly if houses and vehicles are unattended.

Burglars are often opportunistic thieves who prey on houses, garages, sheds, and outbuildings. They seek out any opening that they can take advantage of, specifically doors and windows that are left open or unlocked or are easy to force.

During the winter months, our Policing Teams across all Wards will continue be out to Minimise crime and ASB. Maximise crime reduction opportunities by targeting offenders and providing advice to homes and businesses. Minimise the risk of becoming a victim of crime through high visibility patrolling.

#### Crime advice



By taking small steps in improving security, the public can help prevent and deter thieves.

Make cycle security and registration of your bike a New Year's resolution.

If you got or gifted a bike this Christmas, please keep them safe and secure.

Register bikes, new and old, on Bike Register: https://www.bikeregister.com or Immobilise: www.immobilise.com. We also want people to consider some crime prevention advice:

Lots of cycle thefts are committed by opportunist thieves who see unlocked and unattended cycles as a good target to steal.

There are also thieves who target high value cycles using social media to identify possible cycles to steal. To tackle this and minimise the risk these offenders pose, people shouldn't share too many details about their bikes on social media. Also, if you are looking to buy a bike, make sure you are buying from a reputable source.



There are simple steps you can take to ensure that you don't make your bike a target:

Mays lock you bike when you leave it.

Keep bikes always locked, when not in use, in a secure building.



If you are storing your bikes in a shed or garage, secure sheds them with a strong D lock to an anchor point and consider fitting an alarm.

Humberside Police also advise keeping valuable property hidden from view and making sure that lights are left on at various times, to give the impression that someone is home. In addition to this, particular emphasis is placed upon the need for reliable and effective house alarms, secure door locks, windows containing locks and CCTV systems in place, where possible.

#### Is your cylinder door lock snap resistant?

Check your UPVC or Euro cylinder door lock to see if it is snap resistant. It should be stamped with a three-star Kite Mark.

If it is not, we recommend you get the lock changed to either a SS312 Diamond Approved Cylinder, TS007 3 Star Kitemarked Cylinder, or a 1 Star Cylinder with 2 Star handle for maximum protection. For more information contact the Master Locksmiths Association





There are plenty of simple steps motorists can take to prevent becoming a victim of Hanoi-style burglaries... parking your car in a garage if possible, keeping car keys out of view and easy reach, locking doors and windows; and using Physical security products such as a steering wheel lock or a lock that fits over the gear lever still act as a good deterrent.
