Your Neighbourhood Policing Team (NPT) plays a vital role in tackling many of the local issues that matter to you. They are out in your area every day, and always available to offer crime prevention advice or for you to raise concerns with.

Each NPT consists of a dedicated Sergeant, Police Constable (PCs) and Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs) all under the command of an inspector. While they may be the ones you see the most, the NPTs do not work alone. They are supported by staff and officers from across the whole Humberside Police force area, and they work closely with local authorities, community leaders and residents to decide the local policing priorities for the area and find useful, long-term solutions.

Our approach is shaped by four key themes: We protect vulnerable people and keep people safe; We are out in your communities, visible, listening and working with you to deliver the services you need; We successfully tackle crime and ASB; We will be there when you need us.

Humbertalking has set our priorities, this month we are to:

- Anti-social behaviour Haltemprice and surrounding areas update
- Shop theft ongoing
- Road Safety update

Here's a summary of **just some** of the crimes that have been reported across all three Wards last month:

Residential Burglary reports

3/8/25 Kingston Road, attempt residential burglary to property after suspect enters rear garden and pulls open the doors to the summer house causing damage to the threshold and lock

mechanism before moving to the garage area trying handle with negative results. Suspect is subsequently charged and arrested for this offence and a neighbouring property with a similar Modus Operandi

Business burglary reports -

23/8/25 One Stop Shop, Anlaby, adult male is arrested and charged following report from witness that a male is trying to break into the shop by banging on the window, suspect walks off and returns a few minutes later with a brick and tries to smash the window. He is detained by police and upon arrest he is also in possession of cannabis. Enquiries ongoing.

Thefts

5/8/25 Tranby Lane, unknown person approaches front of detached property with vehicle parked in the drive and places gaffe tape over the ring doorbell camera before attempting to steal vehicle with negative results but stealing 2 x pair of Ray-Ban sun glassed from said vehicle along with the vehicles instruction manual. Enquiries still ongoing.

15/8/25 Marks & Spencer, Shop theft x 2 suspect named for both and enquiries ongoing.

22/8/25 Haltemprice Play Area, theft of mobile phone, suspect named and enquiries ongoing.

23/8/25 Anlaby Park Hotel, theft from vehicle after suspect is seen on CCTV opening all four doors and boot of victim's vehicle which was parked in the hotel, removing various items from the vehicle. Suspect is identified and later arrested and charged for the offence.

Damage

20/8/25 Haltemprice Skatepark, male victim leaves his pedal cycle at the park whilst he goes to the shop and upon returning, he finds that suspects have vandalised his bike by taking it to bits. Enquiries ongoing.

24/8/25 Lowfield Road,

Drugs - no new reports made

Humber-talking has set our priorities, this month we are to:

• Anti-social behaviour – Haltemprice area – update

We have had numerous reports from Haltemprice Leisure Centre and several youths have already been served banning letters. Throughout the summer months we have regularly patrolled hotspot areas, and we will continue to engage with schools to identify any youths involved in ASB and/or any offences.

Shop theft – ongoing

Shop theft has continued to be a priority in the period with notable locations of Morrisons on Springfield Way. We continue to patrol hotspot areas and regular police surgeries have been held engaging with shop staff and customers to deter any offending in the area. Anlaby Retail Park has also been identified as an area to conduct anti-social behaviour and hotspot areas.

• Road safety – update

Humberside has seen a vast amount of fatal road traffic collisions so far in 2025, already exceeding the total number for 2024. We will continue to liaise with traffic officers for them to pay attention to specific areas when on patrol. Throughout the coming weeks and months, we will utilise the pro laser deployment within target areas.

Humber Talking

My Community Alert is a free web service which you can subscribe to and receive bespoke information from Humberside Police and our partner agencies.







It allows you to register to receive real time messages about incidents happening in your neighbourhood that may affect you or your family.

Choose how you would like to receive messages – by text, voicemail, or email – how often you would like to receive alerts and about the issues that matter to you, from collisions and road closures to missing people.

The UK government is testing the Emergency Alerts system on Sunday 7th September 2025 at 3pm.



Your mobile phone or tablet will vibrate and make a loud siren-like sound, even if it's set on silent. The alert message will confirm this is a test and that you do not need to take any further action. Regular testing ensures the system is functioning correctly, should it need to be used in a life-threatening emergency. Find out more at gov.uk/alerts.

You can opt out of the Emergency Alerts including national test, but you should keep them switched on for your own safety. Emergency Alerts will warn you via your mobile or tablet if there's a life-threatening emergency nearby. Only the government and the emergency services are able to send them.

There are simple and effective steps we can all take to be more prepared for an emergency. Visit gov.uk/prepare for advice on how you can prepare.

Back-to-School

Sending your child back to school is both an exciting and busy time. It's important to prioritise safety and have a conversation with your child about how to protect their valuables and travel safely to and from school.

Here are some tips to help keep your child safe:

- 1. Discuss safe routes and travel plans
 - Plan the route: Walk or drive the route with your child this weekend before school starts.
 Point out safe places they can go if they need help.
 - Buddy system: Encourage your child to walk to and from school with a friend or a group whenever possible.
 - Avoid shortcuts: Teach them to avoid shortcuts through alleys, parks, or isolated areas.
 - Public transportation: If they take the bus or train, remind them to stay in well-lit areas and to avoid distractions like using their phone or listening to music with both earbuds in. Do they know a back-up route in case their usual bus or train is cancelled?

2. Talk to them about what to do in an



emergency:

- Stranger danger: Remind your child never to talk to or accept lifts from strangers. Have a code word that only you and they know, which someone can use if you need to send someone else to pick them up.
- Emergency Contacts: Make sure your child knows how to reach you and another trusted adult in case of an emergency.

3. Secure their valuables:

- Label personal items: Clearly label backpacks, lunch boxes, and other items with your child's name. This can deter thieves and help recover lost items.
- Limit valuables: Encourage your child not to bring valuable items or large amounts of money to school.
- Switch on phone location: For children travelling alone we recommend location sharing with Life360 Life360 | Family Tracking App | Location Sharing & Family Safety

4. Get to know their new school:

 Meet the staff: Familiarise yourself and your child with their teachers, pastoral team, and school security staff. This helps build a sense of community and security. Every school in Humberside Police has assigned police schools officer.

5. Report Concerns:

• If your child mentions anything suspicious or concerning, take it seriously and report it to the school or to us.

6. Online Safety

- Using social media mindfully: Remind your child not to share their school routine or location online. Ensure their social media accounts are private and monitored.
- Cyberbullying awareness: Talk to your child about cyberbullying and encourage them to report any online harassment. You can report hate crime online on our website.

7. Communicate regularly

- Check-ins: Get a good routine going for checking in after school, whether by a phone call, text, or a quick conversation when they get home.
- Stay open: Keep an open line of communication with your child about their day-to-day experiences, any concerns they may have, and what to do if they feel unsafe.

Talking to your child this weekend, and throughout the year, can help ensure your child has a safe and successful school year. We know sometimes it can be difficult to talk so make sure you set aside enough time or use videos or news stories to start the conversation.
